


It is US based but given we are so close to the Great Lakes it can be useful for Canada too. It predicts up to 3 days in advance so you know the best day to go out and bird watch!

Spring Gardening Checklist

With all of the Spring gardening "Do's and Don'ts" circulating out there right now, I've gathered some great advice from two sources I feel hit these needs and eco-thinking ideals on the head!

It was believed that we should not to disturb the garden until temperatures are consistently above 10 degrees Celcius. This tends to give the impression that, once that temperature is reached, all the critters overwintering in the decomposing matter have thrown off their covers and are out and about in the garden and all that 'mess' can be cleared away without hurting anyone. This isn't actually the case. There isn't any specific temperature at which all the hibernators have woken up and everyone has emerged from over wintering cocoons or eggs. They are spread through the season in time with the flowering, leafing or fruiting of their partnered plants. Some beings never come up from among the fallen leaves and stems, relying on them for both home and pantry. They help the plants make the soil and are critical for ecosystem health.

So, with this in mind, what do we do to tend our urban, ecologically focused garden in May?

- First of all, spare a bit of thought for yourself and protect areas like upper arms and the back of the neck from the sun before you start to putter in the garden!
- Wait until the soil starts to dry out. If you are leaving footprints, leave it alone. Soil structure is precious, it allows roots to easily move to where they can find water and nutrients. It allows for air exchange (roots breath in oxygen and breath out carbon dioxide, aerobic soil bacteria also require oxygen) soil structure
 - allows water to flow in and be held in all the nooks and crannies of the granules that are glued together through slow, small scale biological activity. Walking on wet soil even years to recover. A good rule of thumb is that if it is too wet/muddy to garden in running shoes, it is too wet to walk on growing areas or to disturb garden soil.
- Pick up all of the garbage that has blown into the yard over the winter and any of the 'gifts' left by neighbourhood cats
- Clear away accumulated leaves and other organic matter off of hard surfaces, like decks, pathways and driveways. If you have a wood deck to scrub, now is also a good time for that.
- Remove matted leaves from any of the tiny plants that will suffer from the cover. Don't dispose of the leaves, just shift them off of the crowns of the emerging plants.
 - For fallen perennial stems, manually cut up the stems and drop them to the ground as mulch. Use secateurs and chop the stems just short enough to fit them between the plant crowns in the garden. They will soon disappear under the new foliage and they will provide a great habitat layer for lots of critters, while also protecting and feeding the
 - Prune any semi woody perennials (Russian sage, lavender, hyssop etc.) and chop and drop those stems as well.





- For still standing stems that are likely to topple over in the coming weeks, as they soften and begin to
 break down, trim them shorter, usually to around the height of the foliage of the plant they are from,
 anywhere from 8" to over 2' tall, to provide nesting habitat for native bees. For short stems (under around
 2') just leave them standing.
- Dig and divide overgrown perennials. Spring is the best time to divide summer and fall blooming
 perennials. Yes, this is the time to do that for most species. Very early blooming plants and spring
 ephemerals generally do better with being moved after they finish their seed development in the summer,
 or when dormant in the fall. For the others, go ahead and move them now. It causes some disturbance but
 transplanting always does.
- Monitor plants for signs of aphids, mites, slugs and snails.



- Allow the leaves
 of tulips, daffodils and other spring
 flowering bulbs to naturally yellow and dry
 before removing.
- Look at the bulb catalogues filling your inbox and mail slot. Consider ordering now for fall planting.
- Pull weeds as soon as they appear.
- Increase your gardening success by incorporating organic matter into the soil before planting.
- Harden off transplants before moving them from indoors or a greenhouse to the outdoors. Allow two weeks to complete this process.
- Place cages and grow-through stakes over peonies that need support as soon as the leaves break through the soil.
- Begin staking other tall plants in need of support when they reach one-third of their mature size.

And that's it. No leaf blowers, shredders or other highly disruptive activities. No organic matter removed from the ecosystem.

Simple One-Skillet Chicken Alfredo Pasta

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 pounds skinless, boneless chicken breasts
- Kosher or coarse salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 4 cups chicken broth, preferably low-sodium
- 1 package (1 pound) penne or ziti
- 1 1/2 cups heavy (whipping) cream or half-and-half, warmed
- 1 cup freshly grated Parmesan, plus more for serving
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley (optional)



Preparation:

- 1. Cut the chicken breasts into 1-inch pieces. Season with salt and pepper.
- 2. Melt the butter in a very large skillet over medium-high heat. Add the chicken, in batches if necessary, and sauté until nicely browned on the outside, but still a bit pink inside, about 4 minutes (the pieces don't have to be browned on all sides; two sides is fine). Remove the chicken and set aside on a plate.
- 3. Do not clean the pan! Those brown bits on the bottom of the pan are going to add flavor to the sauce. Add the garlic to the pan and sauté over medium heat until you can smell it, 30 seconds. Turn the heat to high, add the chicken broth, and scrape the bottom of the pan to loosen up all of those delicious caramelized bits. Bring to a simmer, lower to medium heat, and simmer for 5 minutes. Add the pasta, stir well, and simmer until the pasta starts to soften, about 8 minutes. Stir in the warm cream and the browned chicken with any juices that have accumulated on the plate. Cover and simmer, stirring occasionally, until the pasta is tender, most of the liquid has been absorbed, and the chicken is cooked through, about 4 minutes more.
- 4. Stir in the Parmesan until well incorporated, and adjust the seasonings.
- 5. Transfer the mixture to a serving bowl and sprinkle with the parsley, if desired. Serve hot and pass extra Parmesan at the table.

Alfredo Add-Ins:

When you add the Parmesan in Step 4, you can add any of the following to the pot, alone or in combination; stir over medium heat for another minute or two.

- -1 tablespoon puréed chipotles in adobo sauce
- -4 cups sliced mushrooms, sautéed
- -2 cups lightly cooked tiny broccoli florets or chopped asparagus, or spring snow peas!
- -2 tablespoons fresh herbs, such as oregano, thyme, or parsley

Or, you can serve up portions of Chicken Alfredo Pasta for those who like it plain and simple, and add proportionate amounts of any of the add-ins to the pot.
